


Environmental net gain

A mechanism to reverse the trend of declining biodiversity and ecosystem degradation in order to provide benefits to society






What constitutes environmental net gain?

According to the UK Government's top 10 priorities we will need to measure:



- Internationally there are likely to be different priorities
- Locally there are likely to be different priorities





Key components

- Biodiversity net gain as non-negotiable
- Locally relevant gains in ecosystem services (e.g. recreational access or improved air quality)
- Best balance across multiple benefits
- Net losses fully disclosed and addressed
- Not a single number



How do we measure it?

- Integrated approaches
 - Biodiversity
 - Natural capital assessments
 - LCA, circular economy
 - Carbon reporting
- Flexibility of approach
- Scientific credibility
- Participation and stakeholder engagement


Councils and Local Plans

Drivers & Incentives

- Implement fully the requirements of the NPPF
- Mechanisms for cooperation at a catchment or landscape scale across local authority boundaries

Financing

- Environment bill "public money for public goods"
- Offsetting from major infrastructure (habitat banking)
 - Opportunity for water sector as land managers
 - Support to catchment scale initiatives
- Swell of public awareness and opinion
- Making a clear business case





- Recognise and understand where there might be tradeoffs and reveal those to inform decision







Monitoring & Accountability

"Measurable net gains"

- How do we know when we've delivered it?
- How well do we monitor whether schemes have delivered what they set out to?
 - Indicators, monitoring and verification
- Holding to account
- Informing practice
 - Learning what works and what doesn't







Take home messages

- 1. Address local needs, demonstrate national contribution
- 2. Set red line boundaries
- 3. Don't overlook losses
- 4. Encourage people to think differently Systems thinking
- 5. Break down silos and embed in existing processes
- 6. Make it the obvious choice
- 7. Set the bar high to encourage innovation
